### Introduction

The present book was originally designed, a few years ago, to fill the gap which existed within the series of text books published by The Center for Studying and Compiling University Books (SAMT), books which were to be taught as semi-specialized English to all Iranian university students in Iran. Up to that time the SAMT organization had published a number of similar books was concerning all subjects of study except for the two fields of law with and political science. Since I had worked with the organization and had already prepared various material and books for them, I was asked to fill the existing gap by compiling a semi-specialized (that is, specialized English concerning more than one branch of ... study) book for law and political science. The publication of this book, which I soon prepared, however, confronted certain technical difficulties, and it took such a long time that I eventually revoked my contract with SAMT and had the book printed by the Faculty of Law and Political Science of Tehran University so that I could use it in my own classes there. Since that time, he book has undergone a number of revisions, and has been printed nine times. It has also been utilized in various other organizations such as The Higher Education Complex of Ghom, The Islamic Azad was University, and certain other organizations, some with and some others without the author's permission.

The present version which is published by Nasle Nican Publishers includes numerous changes and revisions and is entirely different from what it originally was some years back. Many of the passages previously used in the text are changed entirely, and most others are revised and updated. The majority of the original passages are discarded and are substituted by new passages adapted from books published in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

The current version consists of 12 chapters including over 50 passages half of which concern law, and the other half pertain to political science. The book is, thus, still a semi-specialized book despite the fact that, due to certain university curriculum requirements, it is referred to as 'General English' in some universities. The reason for this is that according to the official university curriculum, all university students are required to take a 'Foreign language' course before they take their specialized English language courses. This Foreign Language course is placed among the non-specialized, general courses that the students are expected to take. That is why the course is mistakenly referred to a 'general English' course, which it certainly is not.

The present volume is still unique in that no other semi-specialized English text book concerning law and political science exists in our country. It can, therefore, be utilized by all Iranian Universities which embrace faculties of law and/ or political science. It may be used as teaching material for semi-specialized ("Foreign Language") courses in these faculties. It can also be used as teaching material for either specialized English courses in the field of Law, or in the discipline of political science. Some Iranian Universities have done just that.

In conclusion I wish to stress the fact that, since we are living in a rapidly changing world, the present volume too will have to undergo constant changes. I will certainly discard some of its older material and adopt a number of newer passages with every new printing. I, therefore, deeply appreciate any and every suggestion, recommendation, or criticism presented to me by any students or colleagues for the improvement of this book, and I will certainly keep in mind all such suggestions while revising the book the next time.
